George W. Petersen, 67, lighthouse keeper at Pt. Pinos reservation in Pacific Grove for the past 14 years, will retire Tuesday after 25 years of lighthouse service.

Petersen, with Thomas Henderson, operates the lighthouse under civil service. All civil service employes have been replaced upon re-tirement since 1939 by enlisted men of the U.S. Coast Guard. Petersen's place will be taken by Randal L. Rankin, En. 2, who will be transferred from the cutter Gresham, out of Government Island, Alameda.
Petersen and his wife,

have occupied the main lighthouse building since they came here from Pt. Arguello light in Santa Barbara County in June of 1939.

Before that time, Petersen had charge of the Pt. Sur light. His incharge of the Ft. Sur light. His lif-troduction to the one-way road which winds up the 270-foot rock, he recalls, was while he was in a truck loaded with furniture with the sun in his eyes. When he looked aside, all he could see was straight down.

"I got used to it," he says. "After that I made regular trips up every week with loads of oil for three years."

Petersen was born in Chicago in 1886, was schooled there, and joined the Navy in 1917. He served on the cruiser St. Louis doing convoy duty until 1920, and then entered the postal service.

When he heard that the fleet was going to make a goodwill trip to Australian waters in 1923, he hur-ried to get back in the Navy. He served on the USS Colorado 1923-



"Eventually," Petersen says, "service men will also be taken off of lights. Everything will some day be automatic. Some lights have been relieved of personnel already.''
