

Oldest Manned Light

Point Pinos Lighthouse Station is now the Coast Guard's oldest manned lighthouse on the West Coast. Built in 1855, if was one of the first six lighthouses appropriated by Congress in the new state of California. The tower was badly damaged by the earthquake of 1906 and was partially rebuilt in 1907. Otherwise, it is one of the few lighthouses in the country which is still in the original building and uses the original lenses and prisms.
