Famous old Point Pinos Lighthouse and its 78-acre pristine reservation have stood fast through 111 years of history at the northernmost tip of the Peninsula.

And the City of Pacific Grove doesn't want to wake up one morning and find it has succumbed to a bulldozer in the name of "progress."

Thus, after many months of study and careful prepar ration, the Pacific Grove Lighthouse Acquisition Committee yesterday took the first formal step in a campaign to acquire the reservation for the city for permanent/preservation as open spacé.

#### Urge Resolution

The committee unanimously passed a motion urging the Pacific Grove City Council to adopt a resolution calling upon Congressman Burt L. Talcott, R-Salinas, and U.S. Sens. Thomas H. Kuchel and George Murphy to initiate the proper legislation in Congress to bring about the acquisition.

Inasmuch as six of the seven city council members were present at the committee meeting and enthu siastically supported the proposal, there seems little doubt such a resolution will be formulated and adopted.


